# Example 1 - Community Engagement Sara Poore — Commodore BBYC





- The demographic of our local area is 50+% Asian
- BBYC have worked over the last four years to engage with this community. This is working.
- The young people are first generation NZers they want to be involved in active sports.
- We now have 50+% of our young sailors of Asian ethnicity
- We have:
  - Educated the parents via bilingual information evenings on learn to sail courses
  - Taken the parents out on the coach boats on the water, so they can learn and see what their children are doing
  - Trained the parents as volunteers and coaches
  - Provided club boats so they can participate without high costs initially
- Last year we appointed our first Asian Rear Commodore
- It takes effort to overcome the barriers but we think it's essential to try



### Example 2 – Membership drive Allan Geddes – Commodore FBYC



How the club turned membership around in two years

Membership up 36% since last year



Made the club more of a family fun/social environment
Developed a new website and increased social media
Increase of learn to sail by reaching out to the local community
Club revenue is up 80% by maximising club hire and other
charitable trusts



#### **Community Resilience Fund Phase 2**

- Applications close 4 September 2020 (or 18 September for Auckland region)
- Provide financial support to play, active recreation or sport organisations who are experiencing financial hardship as a result of Covid-19.
  - Not the same as Fund Phase 1
  - Talk to Regional Sports Trust
  - YNZ RSO can help too



#### Sport NZ funding support



#### **Tū Manawa Active Aotearoa**

- Funding for programmes or projects delivering play, active recreation and sport experiences for tamariki and rangatahi.
- Programmes or projects that reach groups including those living with a disability, in higher deprivation communities and girls and young women will be prioritised for funding.



## Who are we?

- The Lion Foundation has been fundraising for the community since 1985.
- To date we have granted over \$920 million to support community projects across the country.
- In the last financial year we distributed more than \$38 million to community-based organisations.
- We approved over 2,750 grants that's more than 7 good causes every day.
- This was made possible with the outstanding contributions from the owners and staff at Lion Foundation venues.












## Class 4 Gaming





- New Zealand's Community Gaming Model really is unique and special.
- We distribute 40% of our annual revenue to community groups.
- Our policy is to return 90% of the funds available for grants to their community of origin.
- The remaining 10% supports major and highly effective national causes.
- The Charitable Gaming or Community Gaming Trusts who operate machines contribute around \$13m to the Ministry of Health to fund their problem gambling strategy.









## Covid 19

- 7 weeks loss of income for 20/21 financial year.
- 7 weeks = \$6-8m
- Lion continued to fund throughout
- Criteria amended
- Open for applications









## Can you apply?

#### Is your organisation:

- Incorporated
- Registered Charity
- Tax Exempt
- Providing charitable purpose to the community
- Located within a 5km radius of a Lion Foundation venue (\*with exceptions) or listed on our National Framework?









## What can we fund?

- Any charitable, philanthropic or cultural purpose that benefits the local community – both large and small.
- We fund the arts, culture, heritage and environment (30%), health (15%), sport (40%) and education (15%).
- All grants must be used for goods and services within New Zealand. We cannot fund any retrospective activities or transactions already incurred.











## What can't we fund?

- Retrospective grants
- International Travel expenses
- Certain Sporting expenses
- Grants for individuals
- Vehicles for Individuals
- Food and Alcohol
- Fuel Charges
- Tourism
- Certain racing industry expenses
- Grants already funded
- Grants with a Lion Foundation venue investment/interest.

## The Application Process

- In order to get a grant, your organisation must be incorporated
- It must also have Charities
   Commission registration or an IRD income tax exemption.
- The Lion Foundation receives applications year round. There are no cut off dates.
- You can apply once per year.
- Processing time for an application is usually 6-8 weeks.
- We require a completed application form and all supporting evidence to meet the criteria.

   The Lion Foundation funding should be "The Cherry on the Cake".













- Fantastic buy-in from the sailors and volunteers
- Lots of lessons learned to be shared



#### Clean Regatta





International organisation
Sailors for the Sea has
established **best practice**guidelines for holding a
clean regatta.

Their guidelines list 20 high-impact ways to make your event more sustainable.





There are five sustainability themes which will help prioritise your efforts, especially if this is the first time you have hosted a clean regatta.

What can we do to meet the best practice guidelines for each of these?

#### Elimination of Single-Use Items





- 1. Eliminate single-use water bottles and provide water refill stations
- 2. Eliminate plastic straws
- 3. Serve food with plastic-free dinnerware
- 4. Use or provide reusable bags
- 5. Award gear or use a perpetual or upcycled trophy

#### Community Involvement





- 6. Publicise your sustainability efforts
- 7. Involve local organisations
- 8. Use responsible, educational and reusable signage
- 9. Serve local food or source seafood sustainably

#### Responsible Waste Management





- 10. Assemble and identify your green team
- 11. Ensure proper waste bin placement and signage
- 12. Divert food waste from the landfill through composting
- 13. Use paperless event management

#### Environmental Stewardship





14. Host a beach or marina clean-up

15. Promote alternative transportation

16. Increase awareness of wildlife and habitat protection

17. Offer vegetarian or vegan alternatives

#### Green Boating





18. Encourage water only washdowns

19. Use non-toxic sunscreens or cleaning products

20. Do not offer bow stickers to competitors

## Green ideas for boaties





#### Protect our marine environment



- Oil and fuel minimise spills
- Antifoul and hull maintenance to be done in dedicated facilities
- A clean hull improves speed and fuel economy and helps avoid marine pests
- Blackwater (sewage) know the rules and follow them
- Greywater use only eco products as over flow returns to the sea
- Waste and rubbish minimise, dispose correctly and recycle
- Renewable energy use wind and solar power
- Sustainable fishing follow the Fisheries NZ rules
- Wildlife protection respect, keep distance




