Measuring male and female involvement in clubs.



On average, general committees are made up of 10 members The average ratio is two females to eight males

The range of females on committees varied from zero to 64%

On-water volunteers – overall there are more male than female volunteers No clubs declared more than 50:50 ratio of female to male

On-shore volunteers – the gender mix is more even

What more Yachting New Zealand can do?

- General boating education: help guide people getting into boating
- Advocacy: local and regional council representation, stakeholder support, access, environmental advocacy

- Cruising/recreational sailing: upskilling programmes and raise profile

The main reason to belong to a club changes with age

Members aged 5-12 tend to belong to *learn/improve skills* and to *have fun*, while for those 13 and over the main reason to belong to a club is to *sail competitively*.

What drives a respondent's recommendation?

The top three drivers of recommendation for yachting are:

- 1. Value for money
- 2. Friendly & welcoming
- 3. The social environment

Of these top three drivers, emphasis should be on *the social environment at the club*. This has a relatively large impact on NPS but below average for satisfaction.

What can be improved?

"Promotion of junior sailing and further training to bridge the gap between learn to sail and senior sailing. Once juniors finish learn to sail there's very little training to help juniors progress."

Welcoming to new members, accessible

"Cost involved. Annual subscription + individual courses + boat + maintenance costs. One of the more expensive sports for children."

Parent of sailor, 10 years, Auckland "Only kids learn to sail is offered currently - no adult learn to sail."

What could improve

"More welcoming to new people. More racing for the less fast boats. More training opportunities during the weekend."

Sailor, 30-34 years, Wellington-Wairarapa "Publish a schedule of classes available for both adults and children. Arrange access to small learning boats e.g. Bics so can people sail outside of class times to reinforce learning."

Parent & Sailor, 45-49 years, Otago "Some sort of induction for new members. When I joined there was no real orientation beyond informally meeting a few members who were known to my sponsor."

"Being more accessible and not being full of people who want to have cheap bar to drink at instead of actually sailing and making sure money the money is spread evenly between each division of the club (centreboards in particular)."

Demographic differences

Gender equality at clubs

Compared with last year, less people agree there are appropriate programmes and/or opportunities in place for women and girls at my club (80% vs. 86%). Males are significantly more likely than females to agree that at their club there are equal opportunities for both men and women to assume leadership roles (93% vs. 85% females), and that their club treats all people equally regardless of gender (91% vs. 76% females), and that there are appropriate programmes/opportunities in place for women and girls (84% vs. 65% females).
